Looking back to look forward. Here's an excerpt from Waihi Golf Club "Our Story" 1906-2006. "
Playing the lie (Hollis Bush Course) The tree growing on the seventh green 'shall be deemed to be a green fence post'. A ball landing in ploughed land on the seventh fairway 'May be placed but not tee'd without penalty' On several occasions the Secretary was instructed to contact Mrs Hollis regarding her pigs roaming the course and the ploughing of paddocks at inconvenient times (for golfers) Players obstructed by fences at right angles to the course were allowed to drop back without penalty. However a proposal that players be permitted to 'pull up ti-tree obstructing play of the ball' was not accepted. Rather obscurely by 1914 'stymies' were declared optional for players in the club championships. (A stymie meant another player's ball lay on the green between the hole and the opponents ball). By 1911 the spring growth on the greens, which were receiving extra fertiliser, required them to be cut every week instead of the usual once a month. Present day members might like to reconsider their customary complaints about their course."

Let's combat slow play "Sharing a cart, drop off first player with their club of choice, second player proceed to their own ball."
